General Advising Notes

• Before you get started:

- o <u>Introduce</u> yourself & what you do at the college.
- Ask about the <u>student's goals</u> at NCC.
- Briefly discuss <u>time management</u> commitments of college work (class plus study time) & anything that impacts the student's schedule (commuting time, work, childcare, etc) to help flesh out a reasonable schedule.
- **IMPORTANT:** An advisor's signature on the student's registration form tells the Registrar's Office that the student has met all of the <u>pre-requisites</u> for the courses listed (or that the advisor has waived those pre-requisites).
- **Note re: New:** All <u>first-time full-time</u> students are expected to take Freshman Seminar (FS101) or College Forum (COL100) their first semester.
- Note re: Readmit: Students who have been out of NCC for 2+ consecutive years and had a GPA below 2.0 may want to consider the Fresh Start Option (see form in packet).
- **Note re: Transfer:** Students wishing to transfer credits should submit a Transcript Evaluation Request Form to the Academic Counseling Office.
- Students who have:
 - Never taken ENG or MAT before: need to provide a copy of their ENG & MAT course placement information.
 - Have taken ENG or MAT at NCC: need to provide a copy of their transcript (& a copy of their <u>Degree Works</u> if possible).
 - *Have taken ENG or MAT at another college:* need to provide a copy of their <u>transcript and/or course placement information</u>.

Math Placement

- **Transitional Strategies**: Students must register with a *BLUE non-credit* registration form or via MyCommnet (Math) Banner Code EDUCD5001
- MAT 094<u>E</u> or 136<u>E</u>: Students who place into MAT 094E or 136E (6 credits) <u>cannot</u> register for MAT 094 or 136 (4 credits), even if the MAT 094E or 136E sections are full.
- All students must earn a C- or higher to proceed to the next course level.
- Upon completion of MAT 094<u>E</u> or MAT 136<u>E</u> (6 credits):
 - **Grade between C- and D-**: May retake the course using the 4 credit option (MAT 094 or MAT 136).
- Upon completion of MAT 094E or MAT 094:
 - **Grade of C- or higher**: Proceed to MAT 136 (4 credits) <u>or</u> if more classroom time is desired proceed to MAT 136E (6 credits).
- Upon completion of MAT 136 or MAT 136E: see program requirements.

English Placement

- **Transitional Strategies**: Students must register with Heather DeDominicis <u>Hdedominicis@norwalk.edu</u> (English) Banner Code EDUCD5002
- **ENG 096**: Students who place into ENG 096 & want to be full-time are <u>recommended</u> to concentrate on their <u>English & Math course</u>, along with a <u>freshman experience course</u> (FS 101, 3 credit or COL 100, 1 credit).
- Upon completion of ENG 096:
 - Grade of B or higher: proceed to ENG 101
 - Grade between B- and C-: proceed to ENG 101/101W
- ENG 101/ENG 101W: Students must register with the same instructor- pair these by looking at the section number. Students placed into ENG 101/101W cannot register for ENG 101 alone even in the ENG 101/101W sections are full.

Students are required to take one designated Interdisciplinary course to graduate. The Interdisciplinary course will meet the College Core requirement in the Humanities, Social Science or Science area. The following courses meet the Interdisciplinary requirement:

- BIO 181 Environmental Science (Sci. requirement 4 credit course with a Lab)
- SCI 114 Survey of Science (Sci. requirement 4 credit with a Lab)

Completion of ENG102 is required

- IDS 210 The Creative Voice (Humanities requirement)
- IDS 230 Great Books (Humanities requirement)
- IDS 220 Individuals and Society (Social Science requirement)
- IDS 225 Global Issues (Social Science requirement)

Liberal Arts Electives

Open Electives

Open electives are additional courses students may take to meet graduation requirements beyond their College Core Requirements and specific major requirements. Open electives are defined as any credit course offered by the College with the exception of courses below the 100 level. Selected ESL credit courses may be used as open electives.

Selective Admission Programs

These are selective admission programs. Students can request these majors, but must speak with a Program Advisor regarding admissions requirements for these programs. Admission is not automatic. Students can be advised into pre-admission courses i.e. (ENG101, CHEM111, MAT136)

Academic Standing

Students whose cumulative GPA falls **below 2.00** may be placed on academic warning, probation, or suspension. In that case they will need to meet with a Counselor for advisement.

<u>Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP</u>) If a Student presents with a SAP hold, an academic advisor signature permits the student to register as long as the student is **not on academic warning, probation, or suspension (GPA under 2.00)**.

D4-SAP Hold: Requires an **Academic Progress Plan form** to be filled out by an Academic Advisor. Academic Progress Plans are available in the Financial Aid Office. Student will provide the form to the advisor to fill out and sign.

Maximum Credit Hours which is exceeding 150% of the length of the student's educational program. For a 60-credit degree program, a student may receive financial aid for a maximum of 90. For a 30-credit certificate program may receive financial aid for a maximum of 45 attempted credit hours; An Academic Progress Plan form will need to be filled out.
