Certified Nurse Aide (C.N.A.)

This 108-hour course, prepares students to work in long-term-care-nursing facilities. The course includes 36 hours of classroom instruction, combined with 72 hours of practical hands-on training in the laboratory and clinical setting, which enables the student to deliver all aspects of personal care to clients. Students will have an opportunity to train in both a skilled nursing home as well as an acute care hospital. Students must attend all lectures, labs and clinical to be eligible for certification. Students learn about the physical and emotional changes related to aging. This course has been approved by the Connecticut Department of Public Health. At the conclusion of the semester, students will be given both the State written and clinical exams at no additional cost. Upon satisfactory completion of academic and clinical performance of this course, students are eligible to apply for the state certificate to work in long-term care facilities, assisted livings, and home care.

Entrance Requirements:

- Students must register for a clinical assignment at the time of C.N.A. registration. Students must attend all clinical sessions. This is a time-intensive course; please plan accordingly.
- For payment plan information, see page 1.
- Students are required to have a medical exam to meet state requirements to work in a health care facility and must be submitted by the first class. Students will receive Red Cross Adult CPR Certification, valid for two years. Health Care forms must be completed and submitted prior to the nursing home and hospital experience.

Student Requirements: Students must follow the rules and regulations of the program as described in the NCC CNA Student Handbook. These requirements include a medical exam to meet state requirements to work in a health care facility and must be submitted at the first class. The health form and medical requirements are online at www.norwalk. edu. Click on Continuing Education.

Dental Assistant Certificate

The dental profession is growing and dental assistants are needed in today's job market. After graduating this program, candidates are fully prepared to successfully pass the Infection Control Exam and the Radiation Health and Safety Exam given by the Dental Assisting National Board. Graduates successfully passing these exams are infection control and radiation certified. With these certifications, candidates are highly sought after by dental practices and are preferentially hired. In order to become a fully certified dental assistant, candidates must pass the Dental Assisting National Board's General Chairside exam. Graduates from this program have the knowledge to successfully pass this exam but it requires an additional 3,500 hours of clinical experience in the work place. When all three exams are successfully taken and passed, the graduate is considered a certified dental assistant. However, only infection control and radiation safety certification are needed to enter the workforce.



Dental Assistant Certificate

This five-part program will prepare students for a new career as a Dental Assistant. Students will need to successfully complete four required courses plus a clinical to earn a program certificate.

Entrance Requirements: A high school diploma or equivalent is required. Please bring the copy to the first class.

DENTAL ASSISTANT I: DENTAL TERMINOLOGY AND INFECTION CONTROL

As of July 1, 2018, all dental assistants in the State of CT must pass the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) Infection Control Exam (ICE). This course will introduce students to the profession of dental assisting, starting with basic dental terminology. The main focus of the course is a comprehensive review of infection control to aid the student in successfully passing the ICE.

Entrance Requirements:

- A high school diploma or equivalent
- Students are required to submit a health form to the instructor prior to starting the Dental Assisting III Clinical course. Health forms are available online at: www.norwalk.edu. Click on Continuing Education.

The course includes a comprehensive review of the information needed to assist in successfully passing the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) General Chairside (GC) exam.

Entrance Requirements: A high school diploma or equivalent is required at time of registration.

DENTAL RADIOLOGY

This course will provide the dental assisting student with the fundamental principles upon which dental radiology is based. Content will focus on preparing the student to sit for the "Radiation Health & Safety" (RHS) portion of the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) Certification as required by law in the state of Connecticut in order to expose radiographs in a dental setting. This is a 30 hour, ten-week course.

A high school diploma or equivalent is required at time of registration.

MEDICAL INSURANCE & BILLING

This course discusses medical insurance and billing as it relates to the effective management of ambulatory care offices. It provides entry-level skill practice in scheduling appointments, pre-authorization of surgery, verification of insurance, organization of medical records, billing, and bookkeeping. The course acquaints the student with the major medical insurance programs and issues related to health care today, including HIPAA, electronic medical records, and health care reform. It is designed to offer practical skills necessary to become a successful administrative professional in the medical office.

Medical Coding Certification

The American Association of Professional Coders (AAPC) and the American Health Information Management Association (AHIMA) has established professional certifications known as the Certified Coding Professional certification (CPC) and the **Certified Coding Specialist Certification** (CCS). Certified coders are integral to medical billing and are employed in hospitals, health centers, billing companies, insurance companies and medical offices. With electronic medical records available. many coders may also work from home. Medical coding combines a foundation in medical terminology, disease process, and health care reimbursement and is a unique career path.

MEDICAL CODING II & HEALTHCARE **REIMBURSEMENT SYSTEMS**

This course continues from Intro to Coding (Coding 1) into more advanced and complicated coding utilizing simulated comprehensive medical reports. This course also explores and explains the complex billing and reimbursement systems in hospitals and healthcare systems that utilize coded data as a basis for reimbursement. With further practice and preparation, students can be prepared to sit for the CPC and/or CCS exams.

EKG Technician

In this course, students will gain a basic knowledge of the anatomy and physiology of the heart and an understanding of heart function. Students will learn proper patient information input into the EKG equipment and proper preparation and lead placement for obtaining an accurate and clear electrocardiogram. Students will learn about normal and abnormal EKG rhythms using analysis with hands on practice every class. A brief introduction heart disease will also be included. Patient preparation for telemetry monitoring, holter monitoring and stress testing will also be included in the course. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will receive a certificate. This is an ideal course for CNAs or Medical Assistants wanting to expand their skills.

Entrance Requirements:

- · A high school diploma or GED is required at time of registration
- There is an optional observation class at Norwalk Hospital. If students elect to attend the observation, students are required to have had a physical within the past year in order to participate. These forms must be submitted prior to the second class. The health form is available online at www. norwalk.edu Click on Continuing Education. The NHA certification exam is optional, and students are responsible for exam fees.

Homemaker Companion Certificate

This course will prepare students for entry-level positions in the field of health care. Students will have the opportunity to assist elders in maintaining their independence through in-home services. A variety of job opportunities are available to homemakers and companions trained to meet this important community need. Students will learn skills, including roles and responsibilities, positive communication techniques, professional behavior, fall prevention, how to avoid ageism, cultural sensitivity, escorting and transporting clients, how to communicate with someone diagnosed with Alzheimer's, and nutrition and meal preparation. Students will spend a total of 18 hours over a six-week period learning from a diverse staff in an interactive environment.

Students must pass this class and Customer Service for Health Care Professionals in order to receive a certificate of completion.

Phlebotomy Technician Specialist Certificate

This course prepares students to perform phlebotomy in health care facilities such as hospitals, clinics, laboratories, and physician group practices. The course includes 54 hours of classroom instruction and an additional 30 to 40 hours of hands-on phlebotomy training at affiliates. Classroom instruction includes anatomy and physiology of the circulatory system, legal implications to phlebotomy, blood collection equipment and supplies, and specimen collection and processing. Clinical assignments will be determined by the second week of class. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will receive a certificate and will be eligible to take an examination offered by the National Health Career Association to become a certified phlebotomist.

Co-requisite: Customer Service for Health Care Professionals. Students must pass Phlebotomy Technician Specialist and Customer Service for Health care Professionals in order to receive a certificate of completion.

Entrance Requirements:

- A high school diploma or equivalent.
- Students must submit a health form in order to perform clinical training at the assigned health care facilities. These forms must be submitted prior to the second class. The health form is available online at: www.norwalk.edu. Click on Continuing Education.
- Students are responsible for exam fees.

Physical Therapy Aide Certificate

The Physical Therapy Aide Certificate prepares students to work in the physical therapy environment, assisting therapists in improving the patient's function and quality of life. Students will learn about the profession of physical therapy as part of the health care team, including rehabilitation terminology, PT settings and specialties, and common medical diagnoses. They will also learn safeguarding, transport and transfer skills, as well as skills for assisting with therapeutic exercise, gait and balance training, and other PT treatments. This course includes 12 classroom hours and nine hands-on laboratory hours. CONNECTICUT CHILDCARE COURSE

The purpose of the American Red Cross Connecticut Child Care Course is to prepare individuals who work with children to prevent injuries, give immediate care to a suddenly ill or injured person until more advanced help arrives, recognize childhood communicable diseases, and identify safe action at the onset of illness. This class meets the State of Connecticut, Office of Early Childhood Regulatory Requirements for First Aid and Child Day Care Licensing Program. This is for existing childcare providers and those seeking to become childcare providers. Students will receive a certificate from the American Red Cross which is valid for two years. 




