Health Care Services

The Spring 2022 CNA course will be offered in the early Spring (January – March) and again in late Spring (March – April). Both early and late Spring Semesters will be in an accelerated format with lectures and clinicals running six (6) weeks in length. All students will be scheduled to attend two lab/clinical classes per week as well as two lectures per week. State of Connecticut mandates that all students training in a Skilled Nursing Home be Fully COVID vaccinated. The Nursing Home and Hospitals that you will be assigned to train in

require that students be fourteen (14) days post full COVID vaccination. These Health Facilities are unable to accommodate any exceptions (Medical, Religious, etc.). Students will begin their off campus training during the third week of the semester and therefore the Health Assessment form and the COVID vaccination requirement will need to be complete no later than the second week of the semester. Failure to meet the Health Requirements will result in the student NOT being eligible to continue in the program.



Certified Nurse Aide (C.N.A.)

This 6-week accelerated 108-hour course, prepares students to work in long-termcare-nursing facilities, hospitals, assisted living facilities, and home care. The course includes 36 hours of classroom instruction, combined with 72 hours of practical hands-on training in the laboratory and clinical setting, which enables the student to deliver all aspects of personal care to patients. Students will have an opportunity to train in both a skilled nursing home as well as an acute care hospital. Students learn about the physical and emotional changes related to aging. This course has been approved by the Connecticut Department of Public Health. Students will be given both the State written and clinical exams at NCC at no additional cost. In addition to C.N.A. certification, students will receive Red Cross Adult CPR Certification, valid for two years.

Entrance Requirements:

- In order to participate in off-site clinicals, students must be fully Covid vaccinated 14 days prior to the first day of off-site clinical.
- · Students must register for a clinical assignment at the time of C.N.A. registration. Students must attend all clinical sessions. This is a time-intensive course; please plan accordingly.
- · Students are required to have a medical exam to meet state requirements to work in a health care facility and must be submitted by the first class. Health forms are online at: http://norwalk.edu/wp-content/ uploads/2018/01/Medical-Forms-for-Clinicals.pdf

Dental Assistant Certificate

The dental profession is growing and dental assistants are needed in today's job market. After graduating this program, candidates are fully prepared to successfully pass the Infection Control Exam and the Radiation Health and Safety Exam given by the Dental Assisting National Board. Graduates successfully passing these exams are infection control and radiation certified. With these certifications, candidates are highly sought after by dental practices and are preferentially hired. In order to become a fully certified dental assistant, candidates must pass the Dental Assisting National Board's General Chairside exam. Graduates from this program have the knowledge to successfully pass this exam but it requires an additional 3,500 hours of clinical experience in the work place. When all three exams are successfully taken and passed, the graduate is considered a certified dental assistant. However, only infection control and radiation safety certification are needed to enter the workforce.



DENTAL ASSISTANT II: WITH RADIOLOGY

This updated course blends two integral components of the Dental Assistant Program into one: Dental II and Dental Radiology. It will combine important and innovative lectures with hands-on facility experience, and provide students with a more streamlined approach to earning the Dental Assistant Certificate. Dental Assisting II is an 80-hour course which will provide Dental Assistant students with the fundamental principles upon which Dental Radiology is based. The course will cover basic radiation health and safety—an introduction to dental radiography and equipment and the production and evaluation of dental radiographs. Topics include understanding dental radiation, process radiographic film, identify and correct errors, expose and evaluate radiographs, mount and label radiographs, apply infection control techniques. Course content will focus on preparing the student to sit for the "Radiation Health & Safety" (RHS) and the "Infection Control Exam" (ICE) portion of the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) Certification as required by law in the state of Connecticut to expose radiographs in a dental setting. The DANB RHS and ICE exams are administered by computer only at PROMETRIC Testing Centers.

This course is available to students who have completed Dental I, and the Dental II course which was most recently offered in Fall of 2021. It is also open to Radiology students who have most recently completed Dental II, or those who have previously enrolled in Radiology and wish to retake the course in this innovative new format.

This three-module certificate will prepare individual for a successful career as a Medical Biller in a health care facility. Upon completion of this certificate program you will be able to understand and facilitate the necessary steps for health insurance claims submission and follow-up.

Successful completion of the following courses, with a grade of C or better, are required to receive the Medical Billing & Insurance Reimbursement Specialist Certificate.

Medical Coding Certification

The American Association of Professional Coders (AAPC) and the American Health Information Management Association (AHIMA) has established professional certifications known as the Certified Coding Professional certification (CPC) and the **Certified Coding Specialist Certification** (CCS). Certified coders are integral to medical billing and are employed in hospitals, health centers, billing companies, insurance companies and medical offices. With electronic medical records available, many coders may also work from home. Medical coding combines a foundation in medical terminology, disease process, and health care reimbursement and is a unique career path.

NCC also offers a CPC and CCS certification test preparation class to assist students who wish to sit for either or both of the national certification exams. These courses prepare students to sit for the nationally recognized certification exams.

EKG Technician

In this course, students will gain a basic knowledge of the anatomy and physiology of the heart and an understanding of heart function. Students will learn proper patient information input into the EKG equipment and proper preparation and lead placement for obtaining an accurate and clear electrocardiogram. Students will learn about normal and abnormal EKG rhythms using analysis with hands on practice every class. A brief introduction heart disease will also be included. Patient preparation for telemetry monitoring, holter monitoring and stress testing will also be included in the course. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will receive a certificate. This is an ideal course for CNAs or Medical Assistants wanting to expand their skills.

Homemaker Companion Certificate

This course will prepare students for entry-level positions in the field of health care. Students will have the opportunity to assist elders in maintaining their independence through in-home services. A variety of job opportunities are available to homemakers and companions trained to meet this important community need. Students will learn skills, including roles and responsibilities, positive communication techniques, professional behavior, fall prevention, how to avoid ageism, cultural sensitivity, escorting and transporting clients, how to communicate with someone diagnosed with Alzheimer's, and nutrition and meal preparation. Students will spend a total of 18 hours over a six-week period learning from a diverse staff in an interactive environment. Students must pass this class and Customer Service for Health Care Professionals in order to receive a certificate of completion.

Phlebotomy Technician Specialist Certificate

This course prepares students to perform phlebotomy in health care facilities such as hospitals, clinics, laboratories, and physician group practices. The course includes 54 hours of classroom instruction and an additional 30 to 40 hours of hands-on phlebotomy training at affiliates. Classroom instruction includes anatomy and physiology of the circulatory system, legal implications to phlebotomy, blood collection equipment and supplies, and specimen collection and processing. Clinical assignments will be determined by the second week of class. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will receive a certificate and will be eligible to take an examination offered by the National Health Career Association to become a certified phlebotomist.

Co-requisite: Customer Service for Health Care Professionals. Students must pass Phlebotomy Technician Specialist and Customer Service for Health care Professionals in order to receive a certificate of completion.

Entrance Requirements:

- A high school diploma or equivalent.

ADULT & PEDIATRIC CPR/AED

This course covers recognizing and handling emergency situations, caring for breathing and cardiac emergencies, performing CPR, and using an AED on adult and child victims of sudden cardiac arrest until advanced medical help is available. It also covers caring for breathing emergencies for adults, children, and infants. Basic precautions for preventing disease transmission are also included. Upon successful completion of this course, students will receive an American Red Cross certificate which is good for two years.

Veterinary Assistant

This five-part program will prepare students for a new career in the very exciting area of veterinary health care. Students are required to have a tetanus shot. Upon successful completion of the four required courses plus the clinical experience, with a grade of C or above, students will earn a program certificate. One textbook will be used for the entire program. These classes must be taken in the sequence listed below.

This certificate will count toward the admissions requirements of the Veterinary Technician two-year degree program at NCC (see the Vet Tech Program Director for details).

VETERINARY ASSISTING III

This course will build upon the skills and training learned in Veterinary Assistant II. Students will learn advanced diagnostics and laboratory procedures, such as how to set up and read fecal samples, run packed cell volumes, and total solids. Students will learn how to handle lab samples for both in-house, and reference labs as well as be trained in proper preparation and accepted radiological patient positioning so that they will be proficient at obtaining clear and medically superior radiographs of patients. 

PYTHON I

This course will introduce students to the basics of Python. Python is an interpreted, object-oriented high-level programming language, which has recently become a popular tool in industry and academia. Python can be used for creating Windows, UNIX and Mac applications, from simple console and web-based to elaborate graphic interfaces for video games. Python standard packages such as Numpy, Scipy, and Scikit-learn offer a range of modern methods for big data analysis and constantly expand their capabilities. Take your wire wrapping skills to the next level! This course will build on the foundational skills that were learned in the Level 1-Essential Techniques for Jewelry Making class. You will learn to make shapes and wire components, incorporating intermediate wire wrapping techniques using free form and intricate wire weaving designs, and create 3-4 projects including pendants/statement pieces, rings, bracelets, and earrings. Students should bring to class the following tools and materials: pliers (round-nose pliers, chain nose/needle-nose pliers, flat-nose pliers, wire cutters, nylon-jaw pliers, bent-nose pliers), artistic copper or brass round wires (16-gauge, 18-gauge or 20-gauge, 22-gauge, and 26-gauge or 28-gauge) and stones or beads (drilled stones and cabochons). These materials can be purchased from any crafting stores.

Prerequisite: Understanding of working with pliers and multiple wires is recommended for this course.

THE BEAUTY OF WINTER IN THE **NATIVE GARDEN**

This course covers native perennials, trees, and shrubs with a focus on plants that offer winter interest with persistent fruit, form, and foliage-including conifers. These natives are the plants that provide food and shelter for over-wintering birds and pollinators. With spring approaching, we will look at classic New England native plant combinations and talk about the importance of bulbs and spring ephemerals for bumblebee queens and other early pollinators. Home gardeners are now playing an all-important role in supporting wildlife habitat. Learn about the keystone plants to add for specialist bees, monarchs, and other pollinators. We will discuss how working with your site and utilizing gentle gardening techniques can improve habitat and make gardening easier. Learn how to expand your terrain and add height and depth to your garden by going vertical with native trees, shrubs, and vines. You can provide a succession of bloom through the growing season from early spring into autumn and offer more pollen and nectar for pollinators, while adding vibrant color and more blooms to your garden. We will do simple winter seeding sowing with take home jugs, using our local eco-type 57 seeds for plants that have greater genetic diversity and adaptability to our region. Some native perennials have a reputation for being difficult to grow from seed due to complicated stratification requirements - with winter seed sowing this problem is solved. Your garden belongs on the Pollinator Pathway, join us and learn more.



DESCRIPTIONS OF SPECIALIZED ESL NON-CREDIT COURSES
