HEALTH CARE

Certified Nurse Aide

This course is intended for adults who are interested in entering the healthcare field. The program prepares students for employment in both public and private agencies. Students will learn how to care for people who need help in caring for themselves. Classroom lecture and lab is combined with clinical training at a local skilled nursing facility. Upon completion of the course participants will be able to perform basic nursing skills and recognize areas of safety for both patient and self. This course prepares students for the State of Connecticut Competency Exam. Students will become eligible for the Connecticut State Nurse Aide Registry. Course topics include but are not limited to: basic nursing and personal care to patients; helping patients maintain or regain everyday tasks including eating, bathing, dressing, and toileting; communicating with patients and providing physical (includes heavy lifting) and emotional support to them; making patient observations and reporting them; participating in care planning.

Dental Assistant

A dental assistant works on the delivery of quality oral health care and is a big part of the dental care team. Responsibilities include performing tasks requiring both interpersonal and technical skills, assisting the dentist with the patient, developing dental radiographs (xray), collecting information about patients' medical history, and assisting patients to feel comfortable when entering the office and during treatment. This 350-hour program is designed to prepare students for a career working as a dental assistant in the dental profession. Students will attend a clinical rotation during the program for a total of 150 hours. Topics include infection control, dental charting, preparing the patient, basic chairside assisting, dental instruments and handpieces, tray set-up and procedures, dental materials, and business administration procedures. Students who sit for the National Exam need a high school diploma or GED.

Professional Medical Billing and Coding (CPC-A)

The Professional Medical Billing and Coding program is a short-term, non-credit training program which prepares students to become nationally certified as a CPC-A (Certified Professional Coder Apprentice).

Required Courses: Medical Terminology; Medical Coding I; Medical Coding II; Medical Health Insurance; Electronic Health Records.

Anatomy & Physiology/Medical Terminology*

The Medical Terminology class is taught from an anatomical approach. The class provides a comprehensive training in medical root words, prefixes, suffixes and abbreviations. Topics include disease conditions, skeletal and muscular systems, nervous/sensory systems, endocrine, urinary, gastrointestinal, cardiovascular, respiratory, and reproductive systems.

Medical Health Insurance/Med Insurance and Billing*

An introduction to the world of health insurance billing and the dynamic, growing field of health information management. This 45-hour course provides a thorough, practical overview of key principles and current practices, from patient registration to claims submission. Students will learn the ten steps that clearly identify all the components needed to successfully manage the medical insurance claims process. The cycle shows how administrative medical professionals "follow the money." Medical insurance specialists must be familiar with the rules and guidelines of each health plan in order to submit proper documentation, which then ensures that offices receive maximum, appropriate reimbursement for services provided.

Official Guidelines for Coding and Reporting (OGCRs) are listed and also integrated within the code set, providing fast, easy access to the official coding rules.

Administrative Medical Assisting*

This elective course covers the theory, practice and techniques of medical office management and an overview of the profession of medical assisting and its role in providing quality health care. Healthcare administrative functions, including: safety in the office environment, verbal and written communication techniques, telehealth, electronic medical records (EMR), medical records management, patient reception, scheduling, professionalism and legal and ethical issues will be emphasized. Emphasis is on daily office procedures, financial management, and computer literacy needed for the health care industry today. This course is an elective for the Professional Medical Billing and Coding Certificate.

Electronic Medical Records*

This course provides experience in performing entry-level competences in the administrative areas of the medical office. The material and activities included in the 40hr simulation provides the student with the medical office experiences and acquaints them with procedures, forms, medical transcription, HIPPA, filing, managing records, scheduling, ordering supplies, billing, coding, utilizing effective communication demonstration involving ethical considerations and managements skills. Using current, realistic medical office cases, students build transferable computerized medical billing and scheduling skills. A final grade of 70% or higher is required in order to register for the national certification exam.

Physical Therapy Aide Certificate

The Physical Therapy Aide Certificate prepares students to work in the physical therapy environment, assisting therapists in improving the patient's function and quality of life. Students will learn about the profession of physical therapy as part of the health care team, including rehabilitation terminology, PT settings and specialties, and common medical diagnoses. They will also learn safeguarding, transport and transfer skills, as well as skills for assisting with therapeutic exercise, gait and balance training, and other PT treatments. This course includes 12 classroom hours and nine hands-on laboratory hours. This certificate will count toward the admissions requirements of the Physical Therapist Assistant two-year degree program at NCC. See the PTA Program Director for details: jbresnick@norwalk.edu. Adult & Pediatric CPR/AED

This course covers recognizing and handling emergency situations, caring for breathing and cardiac emergencies, performing CPR, and using an AED on adult and child victims of sudden cardiac arrest until advanced medical help is available. It also covers caring for breathing emergencies for adults, children, and infants. Basic precautions for preventing disease transmission are also included. Upon successful completion of this course, students will receive an American Red Cross certificate which is good for two years.

EKG Technician

Ready to level up your healthcare skills? An EKG Technician certificate from CT State is the perfect way to make yourself even more valuable to employers. The EKG Technician program will teach you basic EKG skills with opportunities to practice on equipment and in hands-on labs. This course includes an introduction to the function and proper use of the EKG machine, the normal anatomy of the chest wall for proper lead placement, 12-lead placement and other clinical practices. You'll learn to analyze printed readings of EKG tests, measure various "cardiac intervals and complexes" and determine normal vs. abnormal EKG results, preparing students with the skills and knowledge to perform EKGs in a healthcare setting. Prior to completion, students will take the National Exam through National Healthcareer Association (NHA). This program is perfect to pair with another healthcare certificate program from CT State, such as our Certified Nurse Aide or Phlebotomy Technician program. Phlebotomy Technician

The Phlebotomy Technician program is designed to teach the knowledge in technical and procedural aspects of basic phlebotomy, including the collection of blood specimens and venipuncture required to become a Phlebotomy Technician. The Phlebotomy Technician program includes theory and hands-on instruction. The program will teach students the concepts of Introduction to Phlebotomy & Infection Control, Legal Issues in Healthcare, Introduction to Human Anatomy & Physiology, Phlebotomy Equipment & Supplies, Phlebotomy Procedures, and Phlebotomy Fundamental Essentials. This program is designed for learners who want to advance their careers or are interested in starting a career in the medical field to become a phlebotomy technician. There is an additional 30 clinical hours scheduled with the instructor. Customer Service for Health Care workshop is included, scheduled on Thursdays. See below.

Veterinary Assistant

Love working with animals but not ready to commit to a degree in veterinary technology? In less than a year you can earn a Veterinary Assistant certificate from CT State that will allow you to begin working in veterinary offices and hospitals caring directly for different types of animals. This program will teach you veterinary terminology, exam room procedures, pharmacology and inventory, as well as nursing skills, vaccine protocols, treatment, prevention of internal and external parasites and much more. You'll gain an understanding of feline and canine behavior and restraint, husbandry of exotics and pocket pets as well as common diseases and medical conditions seen in clinical practice. In addition, you'll learn basic animal nursing skills, such as taking vitals, bandage application, ear/eye medicine administration, vaccine protocols, and treatment and prevention of internal and external parasites. Hospitalized patient care including cleaning, feeding, walking, fluid therapy and pain management as well as the importance of teamwork in veterinary practice will be discussed. Finally, you will learn about the veterinary assistant's role in surgical procedures including patient prep and recovery, surgical room conduct and surgical instrument and supply care. There is also a clinical requirement to complete the certificate.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Emergency Medical Technician

The Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Program is a short-term training program that provides students with the basic knowledge and skills necessary to provide emergency patient care and ambulance transportation to sick and injured patients in route to the hospital. Topics include patient assessment, cardiac arrest management, airway management, patient immobilization, diabetic emergencies, strokes, and seizures. It also covers information about the emergency response system. This course is offered in cooperation with the Office of Emergency Medical Services and the CT Department of Public Health. The curriculum prepares students to take the exams needed to become nationally registered and state certified as Emergency Medical Technicians. In addition, a minimum of 10 clinical hours off site is required.

Official 8-hour State of CT Security Officer Certification

The required State of CT Department of Public Safety eight-hour security officer training class will be taught at NCC by a security professional with a unique and diverse background in the industry. Once candidates have passed the exam and successfully completed the course, they can submit the application to receive and be issued a Security Officer Identification Card from the Special Licensing and Firearms Unit of the Department of Public Safety in CT. Topics covered in this course include but are not limited to, Introduction to Private Security, Basic First Aid, Search & Seizure, Use of Force, and Basic Criminal Justice. Students must take and pass a written examination in class with a minimum passing score of 70%. Students need an ID issued by any State Dept. of Motor Vehicles (driver's license, learners permit, or an ID card). This is the only form of ID accepted. Receipt of Security Officer ID Card is also contingent on the payment of additional fees to the Department Public Safety Special Licensing and Firearms Unit. Students must be at least 18 years old, must be able to pass a criminal background investigation. Introduction to Private Investigation

Private Investigators are energetic individuals with an eye for detail and an interest in security. Both corporations and individuals often call upon private investigators to help them conduct research and perform a variety of detailed investigations. This 20-hour course prepares students for a career in private investigation, and it offers instruction on a number of fundamental techniques such as problem solving, interviewing skills, research formats, stakeouts, surveillance and more. Students will also be introduced to the tools and equipment used by private investigators. The growing field of cyber forensics will also be discussed. And students will learn the CT state laws and regulations associated with this field, along with ethical issues of conducting investigations.

Connecticut Childcare Course

The purpose of the American Red Cross Connecticut Child Care Course is to prepare individuals who work with children to prevent injuries, give immediate care to a suddenly ill or injured person until more advanced help arrives, recognize childhood communicable diseases, and identify safe action at the onset of illness. This class meets the State of Connecticut, Office of Early Childhood Regulatory Requirements for First Aid and Child Day Care Licensing Program. This is for existing childcare providers and those seeking to become childcare providers. Students will receive a certificate from the American Red Cross which is valid for two years. Please check with the State of CT Office of Early Childhood for a complete list of requirements for Child Day Care Providers. CT Childcare Participant Manual will be provided in class. Course Objectives: * To

improve the quality of child care by training child care staff in health, safety and child development. * To teach child care staff the basic first aid skills they need in order to care for an injured child or infant. * To train child care staff to reduce the risk of injuries in the child care setting * To train child care staff to reduce the risk of infectious diseases in the child care setting. * To provide child care staff with a working knowledge of common childhood illnesses, and the care and management of illness in the child care setting.* To train child care staff to recognize and report the signs of child abuse.

Bookkeeping Practices; Mastering Correcting and Adjusting Entries; Mastering Depreciation and Payroll; Mastering Inventory, Internal Controls, and Fraud prevention. A Certificate of Completion will be awarded to students who successfully complete all four bookkeeping modules in the program. To achieve the Certified Bookkeeper credential and designation, you must apply to the American Institute of Professional Bookkeepers (AIPB) and pass their credentialing exams and experience requirements. This application is optional but recommended for employment. Prerequisite: A high school diploma or GED.

REAL ESTATE

Real Estate Principles & Practices

The Real Estate Principles and Practices course is for students seeking to become real estate agents, property managers, homeowners or investors. This course is taught by seasoned real estate professionals and successfully meets the minimum requirements for real estate licensing in the State of Connecticut and meets the minimum requirements set forth by the real estate commission. Students will learn about land use controls and regulations, market analysis, financing, contracts, transfer of titles, real estate law and ethical practices. Upon course completion, students who intend to sit for the state licensing exam (PSI exam), at a separate and additional cost, must pass this course with a grade of 70 or better and attend the minimum 60 hours of classroom instruction required by the state.
